A View from the Vicarage

The view hasn't changed much over the last few years that I have been sharing my thoughts and views. We live in a beautiful valley, in a well-established community, that I have the honour of serving as vicar. It is my view of the community I would like to share in this first digital newsletter.

River has seen down through the centuries plague, famine, war, both civil and international, but this is the first time the parish church has had to close, by order of the Archbishop (if you exclude 1208 when the Pope got mad with King John and closed it). Like many other organisations we have had to move online and adapt as best we can.



The village community during lockdown has been a real source of encouragement to me. Simon and the staff at the Coop; Katie doing her utmost to supply everyone's need for fresh fruit and veg; the staff at the Pharmacy, and the teachers at River School and Abbey preschool, looking after the children of parents who had to carry on. The unsung (but at least clapped for) staff at Applecroft, Riverlea and Woodside. There have been many villagers who have stepped in to help their neighbours, deliver shopping, medicine, parcels. Some have discovered and shared new talents or old ones rediscovered; the art of conversation, joke telling (thank you #99), painting and creating slabs (thank you Vicky), walking the lanes and paths; Zoom, Teams and assorted online meetings (well done RPC).

Yes there have been those who have lost loved ones friends or family members, (funerals have been different) but others have fallen in love, a few babies have been born, the pattern

and rhythm of life continues. God promised seedtime and harvest, and that he would be with us through the valley of the shadow of death – no by-pass – I strongly believe God will continue to be with us as things unfold, nature has taken a breather, so have we, life has been slower more measured.

I have great hope for the future. Life and death will continue, I hope we focus on life and may we grasp the opportunity to love our neighbours as ourselves and to know and love God, perhaps for the first time.



There are a number of prayers in the Church of England's Book of Common Prayer, including one for help when there is plague and pestilence, there is also one of thanksgiving for when the plague has gone or passed over. I can't pray that prayer just yet, but have no doubt that I will in due course.

I intend to trust in the Lord and to keep going, I encourage you to do what you have been doing, don't give up there is light at the end of the tunnel.

Crabble Corn Mill

It certainly has been a difficult time for many and this includes Crabble Corn Mill, unfortunately our biggest fundraiser of the year – the Beer Festival was cancelled, alongside Easter egg hunt, Folk Nights, Quiz nights and Tours. These events help us be as self-sufficient as much as we possibly can with utilities and insurances, therefore we can use local grants for improvements and repairs, as you can imagine the upkeep of an historic wooden building doesn't come cheap!

Our local Co-op, RPC including the events committee, Dover District Council and KCC have provided us monies in the past for improvements and of course we need to mention our wonderful family supporters/sponsors, volunteers and friends of the mill, without these the mill may be telling a different story today.

We are now preparing how we can start to move forward again, our 'pop up' flour sales on the first Sunday of each month have been popular, our Millers Alan and Phil have been busy behind the scenes grinding so we can supply Stoneground wholemeal flour to our local community safely. The 'pop-up' shop is held in main yard, feel free to drive in, Flour is £2.50 per bag, please cash only for this.

Delivery can be arranged to River residents by prior arrangement.

We are also risk assessing the opening for tours, limiting times slots and ensuring distancing measures are in place as well as sanitising for visitors use. We are able to use the Tea Rooms under new government guidelines so please do speak to us on number above if you have any requests for venue hire for small groups where we can arrange tables to suit. For tours the Tea Rooms will be able to provide hot/cold drinks and Crisps only.


Folk evenings and quiz nights are also being looked into.



Kent Wildlife Trust

Few things conjure up a perfect image of the countryside quite like a bee buzzing from flower to flower. A butterfly fluttering across a meadow. A beetle making its way through tall grass. They paint a wonderful picture, don't they? The reality, however, is less than idyllic. Modern living has seen insect numbers drop at an alarming rate. We risk losing many of them forever.

Life systems depend on insects.

Insects make up the majority of our wildlife and are truly remarkable in the roles they play. Pollinators such as wild bees, hoverflies and moths are vital for passing on pollen to help our flowers reproduce and approximately three quarters of the crop types grown by humans rely on pollination by insects.

Insects break down and decompose organic materials. They turn dead matter and waste into usable forms, like fertile soil for healthy crops. And let's not forget that insects are food for many other animals including birds, bats, reptiles, amphibians and fish that we love so much as well as being essential to help feed our growing human population.

Can you help?

The Wildlife Trusts need communities and individuals to help them stop insects from dying out. Two new action guides are packed full of information to help us all take practical action in our local neighbourhood and at home. Just taking a few simple actions can have a big impact if we all act. Together we can reverse insect loss and help the wildlife that depends on insects to thrive once more. Want to know more?
